Keep a lookout for Metro's service changes on **Sunday**, **December 15**. **These changes will enhance the customer experience and improve reliability, capacity, connectivity, and accommodate construction needs**. Changes will include:

- Line 96, currently serving Burbank, Glendale, Griffith Park, Silver Lake, Elysian Valley, and Chinatown, will become new Line 296. Service will end at the Lincoln/Cypress A Line station instead of in Chinatown.
- Line 260, from Pasadena to Compton, will end at Rosa Parks Station instead of its current Artesia Station terminus. Corridor service will be split into two lines with the 260 ending at Rosa Parks and the 261 continuing to end at Artesia A Line Station.
- Lines 177 and 256 will become Pasadena Transit Lines 53 and 33.
- Lines 164 and 165 will have increased passenger-capacity on weekdays.
- The G Line Bus Rapid Transit will run on Oxnard Street between Sepulveda Boulevard and Woodman Avenue. Van Nuys Boulevard bus stops will be rerouted because of the East San Fernando Valley Rail construction

LA Metro to Add Bus-Only Lanes to Busy Vermont Avenue

The \$425 million Vermont Transit Corridor Project (VTC) will add 12.4 miles of bus-only lanes along Vermont Avenue. By 2026, six miles of bus lanes will extend from Sunset Boulevard to Wilshire Boulevard and from Gage Avenue to the Vermont/Athens C Line (Green) Station. In 2028, the project will extend into a bus rapid transit (BRT) from Sunset Boulevard to 120th Street in Los Angeles with "light rail-like stations" plus shelters and other features that reduce exposure to vehicle traffic.

Bus-lanes are restricted to buses, generally to speed up public transport that would be otherwise held up by traffic congestion. Burbank will have 1.2 miles of bus-only lanes along Olive Avenue as part of the North Hollywood to Pasadena Bus Rapid Transit Project.

Foothill Transit Granted Near \$17M for Hydrogen Buses and New Route



Foothill Transit was granted a \$16.89 million from the California State Transportation Agency via its Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program. This will allow the purchase of 30 new hydrogen fuel cell buses and the creation of the new Line 295 route linking the future San Dimas Metro A Line station with Mt. San Antinio College and Cal Poly Pomona.

Hydrogen buses utilize hydrogen gas and steam to create electricity to power buses. They do not produce greenhouse gas emissions since the only byproduct of the process is water.
